A section of connect-the-dot games provides more motor skills development along with helping children learn the order of alphabet, while fill-in-the-blank games reinforce alphabet learning in a different way and provide more practice in writing the missing letters. *My BIG Book of Writing!* is a versatile tool that can help children who are struggling with writing skills to work at a comfortable level, as well as assisting those for whom writing comes more easily to experience the multitrack learning their developing minds are hungry to absorb. Whatever level a child is at, the activities and exercises in this workbook will stimulate the learning process and prepare him or her for reading and other learning challenges ahead.

Kurt presently skates professionally with Stars on Ice and lives in Toronto with his wife and son. Wilson Ong went to Brigham Young University, receiving a B.F.A. in painting and drawing. He furthered his studies at the Art Students' League in New York City. He lives in Corning, New York.
